Implementing Choice Therapy in the Classroom Management ...

A choice theory-based classroom emphasizes the teaching of important

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life skills, like interpersonal and critical thinking skills, over the rote memorization of facts.

Applying Glasser's Choice Theory to Classroom Management ...

In a choice theory-based classroom, students should largely be allowed to make their own choices about what to

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learn, and they should be encouraged to explore new topics. The shift from a curriculum-based approach requires a change in grading as well; students should be graded on their competency, their utilization of the resources available to them, and their ability to apply what they have learned, rather than on rote memorization of facts.

In classroom management. William Glasser's choice theory begins: behavior is not separate from choice; we all choose how to behave at any time. Second, we cannot control anyone's behavior but our own. Glasser also

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believed in the vitality of classroom meetings for the purpose of improving communication and solving real classroom problems.

Classroom Management Plan

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William Glasser introduced the Choice Theory of Behavior Management in 1996. It is based on one core idea: that the most important need that people have is love and belonging. In order for anyone to be able to satisfy any of their needs, they must have a certain closeness or a feeling of connectedness with the family, friends, and

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acquaintances they care about.

Again, the basis of my approach to classroom management is based on Glasser's "Choice Theory" and also to his "Five Basic Needs" being met. A basic understanding of "Choice Theory"

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would be taught to and understood by all students bringing them to the awareness that everything that occurs in the classroom is their choice.

1. Philosophy of Classroom Management

Glasser's choice theory (formerly known as control theory) posits that students

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must learn to control their own behavior. The teacher's role is to guide the student in reflecting on his behaviors and exploring the reasons behind it. Choice Theory encourages discussion, reflection and even making amends in the place of simple rewards and punishments.

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
